We have been to Godalming & Witley and I cannot begin to describe them. Our Camp is

a pine forest. we are in
huts holding thirty men
and they are certainly
more comfortable than
tents.

We have had Church
service to day and the
farther we get along in
military affairs the more
impressive to us are these
services. I guess a good many
of us have been cowards.

This is just a note
to-day we are feeling
fine. I hope you are all
well. It seems about
2 years instead of a little
of weeks that I have heard
from you. Have written
Mrs Harding.
